## **PROGRAM OVERVIEW**

Our program provides youth a foundation they can stand on to embrace opportunity, overcome obstacles and make new discoveries. What makes Cub Scouts truly unique is it provides an opportunity for the entire family to be involved in each child's development.

In Cub Scouting, youth are organized into dens that are single-gender based on grade level. Cub Scout packs, meanwhile, can include any combination of all-boy or all-girl dens. The choice is left to individual pack leaders in consultation with their chartered organization.


#### **SCOUT LAW**

## **HOW DOES CUB SCOUTING WORK?**

#### YOUR SCOUT IS A MEMBER OF A DEN:

- A den is made up of no more than eight youth who are the same gender and in the same grade.
- The den meets two to three times a month. One of the den meetings each month is a "Go See It" or field trip.
- The den has a den leader, but the den leader shares the responsibility of planning the den meetings with the parents.
- In Lions and Tigers, Scouts must have an adult partner at all events and meetings.



## **VOLUNTEER LEADERSHIP**

#### TIGER AND LION CUB SCOUT

Parents are most involved at the Lion and Tiger den levels. The youth and their parent or guardian join the den and attend all meetings and activities together.

Each den has a den leader (one of the parents) who helps coordinate the meetings. The den has at least three meetings a month: one is focused on advancement; one "Go See It" activity (the den, as a group visits a community place of interest); and the monthly pack meeting.

#### **WOLF AND BEAR CUB SCOUT**

Parents are vital to the Cub Scout dens, both in the role of home support and to help the den leader. At the Wolf and Bear level, the Scouts are beginning to be more independent, and not every youth needs a parent at every meeting. The den consists of four to eight youth, a den leader and assistant den leader (usually parents), and often a den chief (an older Scout or Venturer who helps the den leader). They usually meet once a week at a regularly scheduled time and also attend the pack meeting with their families.

### **WEBELOS SCOUT**

The Webelos den is similar to the Wolf and Bear Cub Scout dens. However, more emphasis is placed on the youth learning to take leadership roles and preparing to become members of a Scouts BSA troop.

## **VOLUNTEER LEADERSHIP**

#### LEADER RESOURCES

- Scouts use a handbook to work their way along the trail, completing advancements and adventures.
- The Cub Scout Leader Guide and the Den Leader Guides (available at the local Scout Shop and online) provide leaders with detailed information and themed monthly resources for den and pack meetings.

#### YOUR SCOUT IS A MEMBER OF A PACK

- The Pack consists of several dens and meets once a month.
- The Cubmaster leads the monthly pack meeting, but each den will have a part in the pack meeting.
- Some months, the pack meeting will have special themes such as the Pinewood Derby, Blue & Gold Banquet or guest speakers. Other months may be devoted to recognizing the Scouts for the projects they have completed and achievements.

## PACK VOLUNTEER LEADERSHIP



#### **COMMITTEE CHAIR**

Conducts the monthly Pack Leader Meeting to help plan the program. They ensure that committee members give adequate support to the Cubmaster and Den Leaders. They assist with the recruitment of additional leaders as needed.



#### **COMMITTEE MEMBERS**

Attend monthly Pack Leader Meeting to help plan the program and take care of records, finances, advancement, activities, training needs and membership.



#### **CUBMASTER**

Helps plan and carry out the pack program with the help of the pack committee. Conducts and emcees the monthly Pack meeting. Aids den leaders by conducting the monthly program. Attends monthly leader meeting.



#### **DEN LEADER**

Plans and runs den meetings and activities. Coordinates the den's involvement in pack activities, and facilitate and track the den's advancement.





# HOW MUCH DOES SCOUTING COST?

\*\$66 - YOUTH ANNUAL FEES FOR BSA MEMBERSHIP

\*\$42 - ADULT ANNUAL FEES FOR BSA MEMBERSHIP

This is required annually for all registered youth and adults. An additional insurance fee of \$12 is also required for all registered youth and adults.

#### \$12 - MONTHLY MAGAZINE

The monthly magazine has interesting features on Scouting, sports, hobbies, magic, science and history. There are jokes, comics and short stories.

\$25 - ONE-TIME JOINING FEE FOR NEW YOUTH PARTICIPANTS

#### **PACK DUES**

This is an additional charge your pack will collect for patches, activities and outings it has planned for the year. The cost varies by the pack. There are multiple opportunities throughout the year for your youth to earn the money (i.e. popcorn sale and Scout's Own sale) needed to attend camp and participate in the other planned activities.

#### **UNIFORM**

The uniform and its cost varies by program for both youth and adults. The uniform is an essential part of the program. Wearing the uniform gives members a sense of identification and commitment.

\*These are yearly fees that are prorated by the month.



## PACK PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

#### **BLUE AND GOLD BANQUET**

This is Scouting's birthday party intended for all pack members and their families.

### **CUB SCOUT SUMMER CAMP/ OUTDOOR ADVENTURES**

Lake Erie Council owns two amazing camp properties and offers several opportunities to explore the great outdoors and the adventure of making new friends along the way. Cub Scout overnight camping is offered with our Family Fun Camp, Cub Scout Adventure Camp, and Webelos Exploration Camp.

#### **CUB SCOUT ADVENTURE CAMP**

Adventure camp is typically a three to five day event where your youth can experience the wonderful outdoor activities Scouting has to offer. They may feature shooting sports, bouldering, games, Scout skills, crafts, and much more.

### PINEWOOD DERBY

Scouts participate in the thrill of model car racing! The Pinewood Derby is a parent/youth project in which they build a race car from a block of wood. Scouts race their cars against one another in the Pack.

#### FIELD TRIPS AND SPECIAL OUTINGS


These are great ways to learn more about the people and places in your community.



Scoutbook provides access to valuable tools and resources that will help with the day-to-day management of a unit, giving every leader and parent more of what they need most: TIME.



## LEADERSHIP SUPPORT

Every Cub Scout Pack needs volunteers to make the program happen. To be effective, these leaders need to be trained. This information explains what trainings are available for volunteers. Online trainings are available at http://my.scouting.org.

#### LEADER SPECIFIC

Every Scout deserves a trained leader. Cub Scout leader training is a seamless program that helps leaders easily graduate through the courses, based on their role, quickly and with minimal duplication. Training is offered online or in person.

### BASIC ADULT LEADER OUTDOOR ORIENTATION (BALOO)

This course is designed as an introduction to the outdoor program for those leaders who are interested in adding a camping component to their Pack activities.

#### **WOOD BADGE**

An advanced training for adults designed to enhance leadership skills and develop more effective leaders. The training gives attendees a greater understanding of Scouting aims and methods, while developing true Scout Spirit.

### **ROUNDTABLE**

A monthly leaders' meeting for adult volunteers. Roundtables provide leaders with program ideas and information on events and policies. It is a forum for sharing experiences and asking questions.

#### **CUBCAST**

Monthly audio podcasts designed to help leaders learn more about topics of interest.

### ADULT LEADER DEVELOPMENT CONFERENCE (ALDC)

The ALDC is a local conference held twice a year that is designed to provide adult leaders with resources that will make an immediate and positive impact on their unit's program. Interactive sessions create opportunities to learn best practices from fellow volunteers and Scouting professionals.

#### **BSA PARENTS**

A group formed and run by parents of Scouts to help tell the stories of Scouts and the important role Scouting plays in our communities and our country. Learn more at bsaparents.com.





The BSA has put together an extensive program, training sessions, and resource tools to ensure that all Scouts remain safe. Staff and all registered volunteers are required to complete Youth Protection training.

## YOUTH PROTECTION

The safety and protection of children is the most important priority of the Boy Scouts of America.

In addition to our mandatory reporting policy that removes perpetrators from Scouting and reports them to law enforcement, the BSA has established a multi-layered process of safeguards, including the following, all of which help to act as barriers to abuse:

- Ongoing mandatory youth-protection training for all volunteers, along with educational materials for parents and Scouts that is prominently featured in handbooks and integrated into our programs
- A formal leader selection process that includes criminal background checks and other screening efforts
- A leadership policy that requires at least two youth-protection trained adults be present with youth at all times, and prohibits one-on-one situations where adults would have any interactions alone with children either in person, online, or via text
- A 24/7 Scouts First Helpline (1-844-SCOUTS1 or 1-844-726-8871) and email contact address (scouts1st@scouting.org) to access counseling and help needed to report any suspected abuse or inappropriate behavior
- The Volunteer Screening Database, a tool the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends for all youth-serving organizations, to prevent individuals that were removed from Scouting from re-registering

Youth Protection Training is required for ALL BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA REGISTERED VOLUNTEERS. Parents are also encouraged to complete the training. To complete the training visit: http://my.scouting.org.

# PROTECT YOURSELF RULES ADVENTURE



The Boy Scouts of America is committed to creating safe environments for Scouts and leaders. Child abuse is an uncomfortable topic but an important one for us to cover to ensure the safety and well-being of our Scouts. The Boy Scouts of America has partnered with subject-matter experts from the Barbara Sinatra Children's Center Foundation to present the "Protect Yourself Rules".

Through animated age and grade-appropriate videos and learning material developed specifically for younger audiences, the program aims to help children recognize, respond to, and report abuse.





For completion of the Protect Yourself Rules Adventures, Scouts can receive credit towards badges of rank.

### YOU ARE NOT ALONE!

Your **den** is in a **pack** that belongs to an organization chartered (a **chartered organization**) by the Boy Scouts of America (BSA) to operate a Scouting unit. The chartered organization approves leadership, helps secure a meeting place, and makes sure that the pack works within the guidelines and policies of their organization as well as those of the BSA.

Your pack is a member of a **service area**, a geographic area of the BSA local council that helps support the pack in providing a successful and high-quality program. An employee of the local council, a **unit serving executive**, is assigned to assist the packs in your area.

Your service area also has a volunteer team called the **commissioner** staff. They are a service team that checks on the program health of your pack, and they are a communication link between your pack and the local council. A commissioner is assigned specifically to assist your unit.

Your service area is one of several in the Lake Erie Council. The team at the Lake Erie Council is here to assist you.
