CAMP ALASKA is the most challenging program we offer at **the Firelands Scout Reservation**. Preparing for CAMP ALASKA provides an excellent month-long program for a Scout troop. **Camp Alaska is open from December through February only**. A Scout who has completed CAMP ALASKA has done the following:

Slept overnight in the winter time in a Scout-made site (not a tent), using dead falls or trees to secure it (not tent stakes). You may bring and use sheet plastic.

Backpacked all of his equipment in.

Cooked all of his own meals.

Stayed warm and comfortable.

Spent 24 hours at CAMP ALASKA.

Practiced LOW-IMPACT CAMPING.

Lived by the outdoor code.

In order to make your CAMP ALASKA experience a positive one this year, follow the guidelines. We look forward to your participation. Read on and remember that "prior preparation prohibits a poor camping experience."

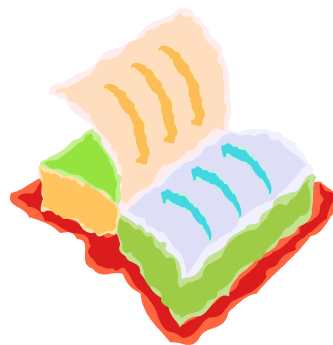

IMPORTANT ITEMS TO REMEMBER

Open dates are from December through February.

“Camp Alaska” is open to all Scouts.

Patches are available at camp from the campmaster.

The unit reservation fee must be paid when making your reservation.

Upon arrival at camp, you must check in with the campmaster starting at 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. on Saturday.

All equipment must be carried to the site.

Always practice the outdoor code – **LEAVE YOUR CAMPSITE BETTER THAN YOU FOUND IT.**

Two-deep leadership is required on all BSA activities.

Check-out is between 8:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. on Sunday at the Campmaster’s cabin.

Your shelter can be any cold-weather shelter except tents and man-made structures (use of plastic sheeting is acceptable.)

All garbage may be placed in the camp dumpster, but must be removed from the Camp Alaska site.

Low-impact camping is the rule.

Please bring a roster of all attending.

Note: Camp Alaska is closed all holiday weekends.
